Before they can identify and work with the theme of a story, your students need to have a strong grasp of

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Identifying Theme in a Story. An English Language Arts Lesson. Theme is one of the more difficult elements of a story to identify. A theme is a story's message. It is what the author of a piece of text wants you to remember most. The theme of a fable is its moral. The theme of a parable is its teaching.

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Story Themes

1. Properly Define Theme: students need to know that theme is the life lesson of a story or the author's message. 2. Prepare Students To Infer: students need to understand that in most stories (with the exception of fables), the author will not tell readers what the theme or lesson of the story is.

Lesson Ideas. One way to track themes is to create a T-chart, with one side dedicated to identifying a theme, the other for recording supporting details that "prove it." Tell students that today we are going to look for the central lesson, or theme, in a fictional story. Go over the definition of theme with the class. Discuss how a theme is similar to the moral of the story. It is a central lesson or idea that is revealed through the events in a story. Note that a story may have more than one theme.
